Academy of Sciences in which position he has achieved a great fame for a large amount of organisation work for the Pacific Science Association. For his important services he received the award of Honorary Life Fellowship. He is succeeded by Dr. J.E. B a r d a c h, director of the Hawaii Institute of Marine Biology.
