Mr. R. ABDULHADI (BO) worked for a year at Brisbane to obtain his Ph.D.

Mr. F.A.C.B. ADEMA (L) will during 1985 move from the Dutch Department to the Tropical one. He has yet to decide on what group he is going to work.

Ms. J.J. AFRIASTINI (BO) spent half a year at L to study herbarium techniques and pre-identification.

Ms. L.J. BULALACAO (PNH) Museum Researcher and project leader of the National Research Council of the Philippines, recently obtained her Ph.D. in biology at the University of Santo Tomas, on her dissertation 'Relation between the modern pollen rain and vegetation sources of Las Pinas, Metro Manila'. It deals with a vegetation analysis of the area using multidimensional ordination methods and cluster analysis. The latter was also used in characterizing the pollen rain data.

Dr. H.M. BURKILL (K) has moved to 4 Mount Close, Leatherhead (Surrey) KT22 9EF, Great Britain. He still works on an honorary basis in K and hopes to have a revision of vol. 1 of Dalziel's Useful plants of West Tropical Africa published soon. It is going to be a long haul and he views with trepidation and doubt the completion of the balance of the work.

Ms. D. DOMACENA-ADEFUIN (PNH) was elected Secretary of the Fern Society of the Philippines.

Dr. W. Donald DUCKWORTH has been appointed as Director of the Bernice P. Bishop Museum (BISH), Honolulu, as of August 1st, 1984.

Dr. G.S. HOPE, Canberra (Dept. Geography, ANU), made a preliminary investigation of vegetation history sites at Soroako, South Celebes. Several depressions infilled with peat are known, and one has been drilled to about 50 m by P.T. INCO. The area is floristically interesting as the ultrabasics preserve <u>Lepto-</u> <u>spermum</u> and other <u>Myrtaceae</u> in abundance, next to very different forests on limestone. These sites should be investigated further.

Dr. K. KARTAWINATA (BO) abandoned his position as Keeper of the Herbarium and joined UNESCO, Jakarta, as supervisor of Ecology. His successor is Dr. S. RISWAN.

Dr. S. KAWANO (KYO) has been appointed professor at the Kyoto University and is head of the herbarium KYO.

Dr. A. LATIFF (UKMB) spent part of his sabbatical year in L from March, 1985, working towards completion of his revision of the <u>Vitaceae</u> for the Flora Malesiana.

Mr. H. WIRIADINATA (BO) has spent a year at AAU to study <u>Mucuna</u>, after which he visited L for 6 weeks to round off his manuscript.
